After nine years as Chief Operating Officer, Rose was appointed CEO of the Pavilions in October 2021. In her first months in this position, she led the leadership team through an initiative to 'get back to basics', focusing on the three pillars of staffing, census, and financial stability. It was through her many efforts that the Pavilions were able to delay the first resident COVID outbreak and boast a high staff vaccination rate long before the mandate. Her wealth of knowledge, experience, leadership, and passion for senior care have driven high quality care for all those she serves.

In total, the Pavilions submitted eighteen nominations of exceptional staff for the various LeadingAge Michigan Awards, of which Coleman was one. Additional, Pavilions staff honored at the recent LeadingAge Michigan Gala included;

The *Outstanding Mentor Award* recognizes the efforts of an individual who has mentored a protégé(s) in the senior services field. A mentor is someone who has nurtured and encouraged others and provided opportunities for personal and professional growth. Receiving this award for Grand Traverse Pavilions was J. Lindsey Dood, Director of Finance, who joined the organization in 2019. Lindsey was nominated as an Outstanding Mentor in recogniation of his extrodinary efforts beyond dealing with the ever-evolving financial reporting requirements for COVID Relief Funding, he provided valuable mentoring, encouragement, and supportive supervision to help grow and advance his staff. With a patient and non-judgmental manner, he has encouraged positive skill development in ways that create confidence. Lindsey promotes awareness of how each non-direct care action affects residents. His leadership by example and willingness to take on new tasks demonstrates that he is an 'Outstanding Mentor.'

The *Shining Star Award* recognizes a gifted aging services professional who, while working for the Pavilions organization, has consistently demonstrated dedication, commitment, and enthusiasm in his/her profession, and has made a significant impact upon the lives of older adults. The Pavilions nominated, Jamie Wilson, RN, who came to Grand Traverse Pavilions as a nurse aide, graduated from nursing school as an RN, and now works as the Director of Staff Development. In that role, she offers staff the same compassion and respect that she long provided to residents and families. Passionate about quality of care, she has made a significant impact on the lives of elders. Jamie works tirelessly and her friendly, can-do attitude makes her a great resource for peers and staff. Her entire career has prepared her to serve as their advocate. She has accepted the challenges of the pandemic with the grace and professionalism of a shining star, amplifying her skills as needed to support staff in their work to keep residents safe.

The Caring Spirit Award recognizes the achievements of front-line staff and direct care employees who have made a significant impact upon the lives of older adults. Nominees have made significant and positive impact in the lives of seniors, possesses a strong commitment to residents, and inspires and promotes excellence in others. Grand Traverse Pavilions had two nominees in this category. Ruth Walton, serves residents and staff by going beyond her job duties as housekeeper – she spreads joy, love, and happiness with all she comes into contact. Ruth takes great care to ensure that the environment is clean and safe, but she is truly a vital part of Grand Traverse Pavilions as she helps wherever and whenever needed.
