s we enter the season of Gratitude there are so many opportunities to share thanks. I'm especially thankful for the Pavilions staff, the families that entrust their loved ones to our care, and to our community partners who have demonstrated their commitment to Grand Traverse Pavilions. I'd like to also express my personal gratitude to the Grand Traverse County

Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Board, for their vote of confidence in my administrative ability to lead the Pavilions organization during this transition of leadership.

Last month we had a retirement reception to honor two gentlemen who dedicated a large portion of their careers, and lives, to the service to others. Ralph "Chief" Sofferdine, not only served the community as Fire and Police Chief in Grand Traverse County, but he also served as Chairman of the County Department of Health and Human Services Board, which governs the Pavilions as the County's Municipal Senior Care facility. We also celebrated the contribution of Kory Hansen, who served the Pavilions for nearly 30 years - the last twelve as CEO/Administrator. These two gentlemen helped expand the Pavilions services over three decades, and were central in establishing the Program of All-inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) North for our region. Their contributions for the safety and care our seniors and our families are to be commended, and we owe them both our sincere "Gratitude."

While I'm giving thanks, there is an entire group of people that I personally want to acknowledge. They are the front line or direct care workers (and those who support them)! We all have

times in our career when we have been asked to give a little extra, work late a few nights, take on an extra shift, or help out a co-worker that isn't feeling well. However, no one is emotionally or physically prepared to work at the level, or for the duration, that our health care workers have been required to endure over the past twenty months during the pandemic. The senior care industry has been especially hard hit from the onset of the COVID outbreak. Nursing homes, their staff, and their vulnerable elderly residents across the country have been significantly impacted, not just by the virus, but by the negative press and the fear that has resulted in hundreds of thousands of healthcare workers leaving the field, many after vibrant careers as nurses and certified nursing assistant (CNA) caregivers. While this is indeed a national trend, it is now being called a national healthcare worker "crisis" that is undeniably impacting our local community.

The Pavilions leadership, along with the DHHS Board, recently acknowledged this challenge, which has recently forced us to limit new admissions. The safety of our residents and staff is our greatest priority. Therefore, we must make these difficult decisions responsibly to safely manage the resident-tohealthcare-worker ratio, which, in turn, insures we are able to deliver the highest quality of care. We are now actively recruiting all levels of healthcare workers and have recently received approval to increase our starting wages for direct care workers. Never before have healthcare workers been so needed! If you are considering a career in healthcare, are recently retired, or were one of the care workers who decided to take a break from healthcare during the pandemic, we ask you to "please consider coming back and caring for your community." We invite you to read the article about some of the new benefits and increased wages we are offering in the "Come Back to







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Caring" article by Diane Mallory, Human Resources Director for the Pavilions.

To the residents and families who have expressed their loyalty and confidence in the Pavilions staff, I am incredibly grateful. To the staff who have demonstrated their commitment to caring for our communities elders during these challenging times, we celebrate your caring nature! And to those of you who are considering returning or starting a career in caring for others — we welcome you! This is a great time to join the Pavilions as we are preparing to institute new wage and benefit incentives for our Pavilions family as we regrow our ranks.

I remain honored, and humbled, to be able to help lead the Pavilions organization during these times of great change and opportunity. I'm also very optimistic that as vaccination rates increase, and infection rates decline, we are on our way to seeing the pandemic as a thing of past. 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Come Back To Caring

rior to the COVID Pandemic there was a Healthcare worker shortage in Michigan. According to Bridge Michigan (www.bridgemi.com Feb. 5, 2021) there are more than 120,000 healthcare related jobs in the state, however, there is a shortage of 34,000 workers, or nearly 30% of the healthcare workforce needed in Michigan. So, the workforce shortage is not an issue unique to Grand Traverse Pavilions, or Grand Traverse County, however, it may seem more intense in our region because we have a significantly higher number of aging adults than most other regions of the state, or nation.

The Grand Traverse Department of Health and Human Services acknowledged the healthcare worker challenge and was supportive at their last meeting by recognizing that more needs to be done to entice potential workers to the Pavilions. With this in mind, the following are some of the most recent incentives that are being offered starting in the New Year (2022) to new, or previous, healthcare workers to help

encourage them to "come back to caring" for our community:

- The State "Essential Worker Bonus" of \$2.35 per hour has been extended through the current year (state budget) for direct care staff.
- Starting wage for Certified Nurse Aides has been increased to \$18.02 per hour
- Shift differentials increased to \$2.00 per hour and \$1.00 per hour weekends
- Wages for nurses... LPN \$24.42, RN \$32.50
- New The Pavilions will establish
 a Defined Contribution Plan that
 starts upon hire (no need for "vesting" over a multi-year period) for
 all full-time staff, that is portable
 if they should decide to change
 careers in the future, with the Pavilions contributing 5% of gross wages.
- New Early Wage Access is an opportunity to get paid for hours worked prior to your regular scheduled payday



 New Current Employees can earn a \$1,000 referral bonus for helping to hire full time essential direct care workers such as a Nurse, CNA and Universal Worker

Additionally, also new to the organizations is a "Services Sharing" bonus that if we collectively are able to grow our direct care staff, which will in turn allow us to increase our daily resident census, we will all share in a Service Sharing Bonus based on the increased revenue generated by the additional revenue for our organization. This creates a collective incentive to hire, support and retain our staff going forward.

That's a Wrap...

The ability for residents to enjoy the outdoors, excursions in the community, and local grocery shopping is all dependent on our ability to transport them safely. Recently the Pavilions was able to purchase a new Transport bus in great thanks to the generosity of The Hayden Family Foundation and The Art and Mary Schmuckal Family Foundation (as promoted in the Spring 2021 issue of Legacy. However, the ability to use the bus to help promote recruitment efforts for Certified Nurses Aids and other available health-care worker positions was an innovative approach while also to helping to build brand awareness of Grand Traverse Pavilions in our community.



Benevolent Care: Family Paying it Forward

eing the oldest child in a family often includes inherent responsibilities for looking out for your younger siblings. However, for Barbara Lemcool. the role of "Big Sister" for her younger sisters has been a lifelong commitment. She admitted that it has not always been easy, having lost one of her younger sisters, Lynn, way too early in life. Barb shared her two remaining sisters. Rebecca (the youngest) and Andria, are currently not in the best of health. Barbara currently serves as Co-Guardian for her sister, Andria, along with her Niece Jennifer. Jennifer, who works as an Activities Director for a local Independent senior care facility stated "Having my Aunt Barb help me with Mom's care has been wonderful - it would have been overwhelming to have to make decisions about her care by myself." While Barb welcomes the opportunity to continue to care for her younger sisters, she admits, "I'm so grateful to the staff and leadership at Grand Traverse Pavilions. They really are a God-send for families, like ours, and so many others who have to make difficult decisions for the care of their loved ones."

Barbara, and her husband Herb Lemcool, are no strangers to the mission of Grand Traverse Pavilions. Herb served as the County Liaison from the Grand Traverse County Board of Commissioners to the County Department of Health and Human Services Board from 2008 – 2012. He was, in fact, part of the team that had regular discussions regarding how the Pavilions, as a municipal/public senior care facility, would serve the aging needs of the County's adult population. He never imagined that those discussions would one day directly impact his family.

As Barbara described, this greater sense of awareness of the importance of the

Pavilions has gifted them with an affinity for the work that Grand Traverse Pavilions had done for our community. She admits, it wasn't until most recently when Barb's sister Andria needed some assistance to transition from being independent, to living in a care facility, that she fully realized the scope of the Pavilions services. The Pavilions, a full-continuum of care, which includes Outpatient Wellness services, a Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF) offering Rehabilitation services, Memory Care, as well as, Independent and Assisted Living residential services at the Cottages. Barb shared that Andria, who also made a career out of caring for aging adults, was initially adamant about not being "put in a home." However, when her care needs became more than Jennifer and Barbara could handle, they had to make that difficult decision. "I can't say enough about Shelby, Residential Services Director at the Cottages. Shelby literally took Andria by the hand and together they went to lunch at Willow Cottage, immediately Andria felt this was a place where she felt safe and secure." According to Barbara.

Andria is like many residents at the Cottages, who may not have extensive

savings or resources to afford their care, but because of the charitable mission of the Pavilions Foundation, it has been able to offer modest financial assistance to eligible individuals through the Pavilions Benevolent Care Endowment Fund. Barb explained "Andria dedicated her life to the care of others. She was a single mother, who raised three children by herself. She wasn't able to save, or establish a retirement savings. Her assets are modest. So to know that she can receive such wonderful care, and have a quality of life at the Pavilions that includes the summer concerts on the lawn. socialization with others in her condition, enjoy games, trips in the community, and quality care... it gives me peace of mind that she is in capable and compassionate hands."
